**Annual Report for 2024**

***The B&G Committee's Job Description -***

B&G is responsible for the operation & maintenance of the church buildings and property, including:

- Maintaining all equipment and facilities.
- Arranging for work sessions for cleaning, general maintenance, and campus upkeep, etc.
- Reviewing and recommending appropriate insurance coverage for the church.
- Organizing and maintaining kitchen facilities and equipment.
- Maintaining the esthetics of the buildings and campus.
- Providing property management services.

***Security & Safety -***

- There was an inspection of the Palmer Center in April by the Arizona Department of Development. There were no issues identified during the inspection. This was a requirement for the summer camp planned by Assure Healthcare Group.
- The Town of Gilbert Fire Department conducted an inspection of both buildings in May. There was one issue identified to correct gaps in the electrical panel in the Sanctuary building. The gaps were corrected, resulting in a passing inspection.
- The fire system and alarm provider, Cross Fire Protection, conducted the annual test and inspection in both buildings in August. This included the sprinkler system, smoke alarms, emergency lights and exit lights, and fire extinguishers. There were three issues identified: two failed emergency lights were replaced in house; two pressure gauges on the sprinkler system were out of date and replaced in house; the tamper switch on the fire water supply valve was not functioning, this was rewired and replaced by Cross Fire in September.
- There were four documented alarms/warnings of the Palmer Center fire alarm system in 2024. The alarms were as follows: temperature change sensor warning in May, alarm cleared, and was rechecked during the annual fire system test; power loss warning in May, related to the APS transformer change out; smoke alarm warning in September, service call found and cleaned a smoke sensor; backup battery alarm in November,

backup batteries were replaced. We continue to timely respond, investigate and repair where necessary the fire system alarms.

### ***Contracts & Documents -***

- Service agreements for janitorial and HVAC inspection were rebid in 2024. Janitorial remained with Kunz Janitorial without a price increase. HVAC Inspection was moved to Mason Pro Services with a price savings over the incumbent service company. Landscape remained with the same contractor (Umbrella Landcare) without a price increase for 2024.
- Facility Rentals for 2024 included: Revival Presbyterian Church; four AA/Al-Anon/NA organizations (4 nights/week); Venture Upward School (1 day/week); Paradise Earth Academy (4 days/week) and Assure Healthcare Group. Assure Healthcare Group conducted an eight week summer camp for children with developmental disabilities in the June/July timeframe when the other school organizations were not in session.
- The Palmer Center building is now utilized six days/week and most nights.
- Along with increased utilization of the church campus, there were several issues that were mediated. This is not unexpected for space shared by eight tenants in addition to the GPC family.
- The GPC Lease Fee Schedule was refreshed, and the update approved by Session in April.
- The Key Issue Policy was reviewed and refreshed.

### ***Interior Repairs -***

- Plumbing was repaired / replaced as necessary.
- Lighting was repaired / lamps and bulbs replaced as necessary.
- The Narthex ceiling was repaired and retextured in April. Repairs made to the flat roof of the Sanctuary building in 2023 have so far been effective at preventing water damage to the Narthex ceiling.
- Carpeted areas in both buildings had additional attention. Problem areas were cleaned using the church's carpet cleaner. Minor repairs continued on areas with loose carpet fibers. Two carpet spill kits were assembled and placed in the two areas in the Palmer Center with the highest use.
- The janitor closet in the Palmer Center was de-inventoried of any hazardous materials, some supplies and cleaning materials that are no longer in use.

### ***Exterior Repairs -***

- The flat roof portions of both buildings were inspected. Several leaks and blisters were repaired with the silicone elastomeric material used for the roof coating. This activity will be repeated on an annual basis.
- A water leak on the supply line to the campus was identified and repaired. The leak was near the Town of Gilbert service entrance, and required an excavation 4-5 feet deep. The initial estimate for the repair by a plumbing contractor was \$4,000-5,000. The repair was done with B&G committee members and a contractor, with all costs donated by B&G members.
- The transformer located at the electrical service entrance was replaced by APS in May. This is an APS owned piece of equipment.
- The crushed stone areas by the water leak repair and in the patio area were topped off to bring the level back up to the sidewalk level and minimize any tripping hazard.

### ***HVAC -***

- All service disconnect switches for the eleven rooftop HVAC units on the Palmer Center were reconditioned. This item had been noted in the HVAC inspections.
- One of the two compressor units that heat and cool the Sanctuary was found to be low on refrigerant during the pre-cooling season inspection. A leak was identified, repaired and refrigerant added.
- The Sanctuary HVAC unit noted above consists of two compressors that are 22 years old, and one air handler that is 36 years old. An estimate was requested for this unit, so that the replacement cost is well understood when this unit needs replacement.
- The Narthex HVAC unit failed in late June. This was also a 22 year old compressor unit and 36 year old air handler. Multiple bids were received, Session approval for the expenditure received, and the unit replaced in late July.
- There were multiple problems with the programmable thermostats in the Palmer Center. The problems resulted in several instances where the HVAC units would not function properly. The problems appeared to be related to the power outage that happened when the main transformer was replaced in May. Some diligent troubleshooting and reprogramming appeared to have fixed the problem, but a change out will start on these older thermostat models.
- The fan motor for the Kitchen Area HVAC in the Palmer Center failed, and will be replaced in-house in early 2025.

- In recognition of the age of the 17 HVAC units in the two buildings, we resurrected and updated a replacement schedule, including expected replacement costs. Eleven of the 17 units are greater than 20 years old. A budget item was added to include additions to the reserve fund so GPC is better prepared for the eventual failure of the units.

### ***Landscaping & Irrigation -***

- The trimming of the seven Russian Olive trees next to the west parking lot was brought in house in 2024. This resulted in a savings of \$1500 versus the price quoted by the contractor who previously did this service.
- The garden area used by PEA was equipped with a new irrigation controller, hose bibb and irrigation risers and emitters. The equipment and installation was donated by a B&G member.
- Palm trees on the church property (eleven in total) were trimmed, with the service donated by a B&G member.
- The main irrigation controller for the church campus failed in May, and was replaced. The equipment and installation again was donated by a B&G member.
- Various leaks on the irrigation zones, both from emitters and piping were repaired as needed.
- The lawn was overseeded in the Fall. The lawn is actively used by the school groups in the fall, winter and spring.

### ***Other Miscellaneous -***

- The B&G Committee started a project to mitigate possible damage from water leaks in the buildings. There was an inspection, and a project list put together. The projects include: replacement of one deteriorated water heater; adding containment pans with drains to the water heaters where not present; adding drains to the Palmer Center restrooms; installing leak detectors in key areas with call out capability. The projects should be completed in 2025.
- The B&G Committee started looking at building maintenance in the Palmer Center to make sure that the high level of use in that building does not result in deterioration of the condition or appearance of that building.

### ***Donations of time, materials & money -***

The B&G committee once again provided time, talent and treasures for maintenance and improvement of the church campus. Donations of equipment and service for 2024 were in excess of \$2500. The willingness

of B&G members to help with our stewardship of the church campus is priceless!

***Meeting day/time -***

B&G meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 7pm virtually via Zoom.

## **Board of Deacons Annual Report 2024**

The Board of Deacons for 2024 consisted of the following: Bret Blackburn (2024), Carole Blake (2026), Linda Gibbons (2024), Betty Gleason (2024), Cheri Peterson (2026), Diane Schans (2025), Betty Walford (2024), Mary Ann Wilkie (2025) and Cheryl Williams (2025).

Two Deacons each month were happy to organize and host the Fellowship Time each Sunday morning following worship. This is an important time for the congregation to gather casually and visit with each other. The Sunday morning crowds grew as the year went on. It was decided to reduce the “menu” of fellowship time to beverages only during the summer months June, July, August and September when crowds were smaller and there are fewer Deacons available.

The Deacons provided flowers to honor ladies on Mother’s Day Sunday and small candy bars to honor men on Father’s Day Sunday. A new tradition was started of providing a cake during coffee time to honor new members on the Sunday they join.

The Deacons were happy to help with the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration on October 6<sup>th</sup>. The event was a great success with the careful planning of a special 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee.

Each Deacon made an effort to stay in touch with their flock members and to keep the office apprised of any who were moving away or leaving the church. They kept the congregation up to date on events coming up in the church calendar.

Pastor George and Deacons were happy to visit elderly members in their homes and to serve communion.

At the December meeting, we welcomed new Deacons: Thomas Lemme (2027), Norm Haskett (2027), Rocky Mackey (2025), Kevin Burgess (2027) and John Paterson (2025).

## GPC Christian Education Annual Report for 2024

Members of the Christian Education committee included Judy Sullivan (chair), Ginny Goodbar (co-chair), Linda Gibbons, Lynn Clapper, Cheryl Williams, Ginger Williams, David Burel, and Pastor George Prohaska.

The GPC Child Safety policy was revised and approved by Session. Background checks are being conducted for all paid employees and will next be completed for all volunteers who work with children. An on-line training will be provided to all who pass the background check.

GPC provided financial support to the Montlure Traveling Day Camp program, and several children from GPC attended.

Alex Martin was presented with a Bible in May, a tradition for students completing third grade.

For the 2024-25 school year, the children's Sunday school class is using a new curriculum, "Awesome Adventures", which is put out by the PC (USA) store.

The midweek Bible study group studied the Book of Revelations.

The adult video Sunday school class studies included "Be Still and Know I Am God", and "He Chose The Nails".

The second adult Sunday school class studied famous theologians and also studied The Confession of 1967.

The monthly book discussion group read Freeing Congregational Mission. Due to a low number of participants, the group is looking to move to in-person meetings in the future, in the hopes of upping participation.

For 2025, we are looking for additional volunteer teachers for all of the Sunday school classes.

## **GPC Finance Committee Annual Report for 2024**

Committee members for the start of 2024 were: Mary Sumner (Chairperson), Bruce Jackson (Co-Chairperson), John Stover, Carole Blake, Greg Smith, Sue Jax and Pastor George Prohaska.

Sue Jax resigned from the committee in the summer of 2024.

Marla Jackson and Anne Barton completed the yearly audit on January 28, 2024, finding that the financial statements did accurately reflect the position and operations of GPC.

In January 2024, Hoyte Mitchell gave an update on pledges for 2024. Pledges received were \$166,272.0 and \$2,233.00 for Per Capita.

There was no meeting in February 2024.

At the meeting in March the reports for the months of January and February stated our income exceeded our expenses by \$7,824.71.

A donation of \$500.00 from Western Theological Seminary was received. It was approved by the Mission Committee to issue a check for these funds to Paradise Earth Academy to help support them.

There was no meeting held in April, 2024

In May the I.T. committee was formed with a new G/L of 55495. With Pastor Prohaska had requested 10 weeks off for the summer which reduced in his salary. These funds were made available to cover the Info Tech expenses. A motion to Session was made to have these funds of \$5,800.00 moved for G/L account 51111 (Pastor's Salary) to G/L account 55495 (IT).

June 2024, The Tech team was able to update our membership database from an obsolete version of Servant Keeper to a cloud-based, fully supported version. This database is used to maintain the church roll as well as pledging/giving records. The Tech team were able to switch to a satellite internet service to save \$100.00 per month in access fees.

An update was given by Greg Smith (Buildings & Grounds Chairperson) concerning repairs for the A/C units for two of the sanctuary compressors and the refrigerant recharged. The cost was \$3,100.

No meeting was held in July 2024

August 2024, one of the narthex air conditioning systems had to be replaced. Cost was \$9,244 that was installed July 25,2024. Plans were beginning to be made for the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration to be held in October.

No meeting was held in September 2024.

October 2024, The 40th Anniversary celebration was held October 6,2024, it was a great event and all funds to pay for this were donated. Greg Smith shared the five-year plan that was not funded in the last budget go-around. The budget committee had started to work on the budget for 2025 and this item will be included.

No meeting was held for November 2024. However, the 2025 budget was completed and was to be presented to the Session on Tuesday, November 19,2024.

December 2024, As of December, 40 pledge cards have been received. These totaled \$135,000.00. Mary sent pledge cards to people who had pledged the prior year but had not yet pledged for 2025. It was agreed to move “Per Capita” from mission support G/L (86102) to general expenses (new line item 54190) for 2025.

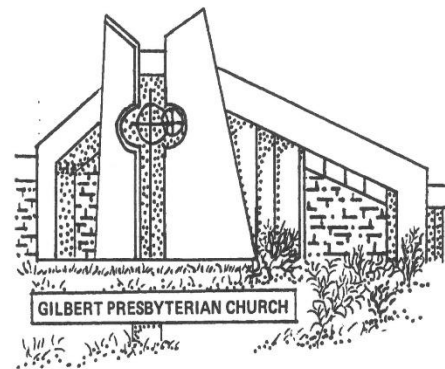

## Annual Report – Presbyterian Women

2024

The Presbyterian Women of Gilbert Presbyterian Church met in person at 10:00 am on the third Saturday of each month except July and August when temps were high and folks were vacationing. Officers were Moderator, Carole Blake; Secretary, Pam Russell; and Treasurer, Judy Davis

We worked our way through the annual Bible study, “Let Justice Roll Down”, with members taking turns leading each monthly lesson. Just an editor’s comment: “It was not our favorite study.”

Gaill Blackburn was the hardworking Chairperson of our Christmas Cookie Sale again this year. She organized the staffing positions and did all the art work and advertising releases. All our ladies were involved one way or another. The congregation and guests seemed really pleased with the assortment of cookies. We received \$1,245 for our Mission projects.

Due to the generous support of our Christmas Cookie Sale in December, 2023, we are happy to have money to send to our favorite Mission Projects. We voted to send \$300 to the **Outreach Foundation** in support of Sebber Banda; and \$200 to **Christ for the Island World of Indonesia**; \$200 for **Justa Center** in Phoenix; \$500 for **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance**; and \$200 to **Family Promise**. These missions support work around the world and locally right here in the east valley.
